The purpose of the Pilot Knob Amateur Radio Club (PKARC) is to further the exchange of information and cooperation among members, to promote radio knowledge, fraternalism and individual efficiency, to provide assistance to the best advantage in the event of emergency, and to conduct club programs and activities to advance the general interest and welfare of amateur radio.

PKARC is an ARRL Special Service Club. The club participates in various activities in Leavenworth County by providing communications for local events, emergency communications, and promotion of the amateur radio service throughout the community.

Anyone interested in the activities of this organization will be eligible for membership. Members must comply with FCC rules and regulations, as well as rules established by the club. Dues are \$25 per year (no extra cost for spouse or minor children who are amateurs). Meetings are held the first Thursday of each month at 7:30pm at the American Red Cross, 525 Shawnee in downtown Leavenworth and are open to the public.

The weekly **PKARC** Net is held every Wednesday evening at 7:30pm local time on the 147.00+ repeater (PL tone of 151.4 required) as well as a 70cm Net every Sunday at 7:00pm, on the 444.800+ repeater. All amateurs are invited to join, and visitors are always welcome!

The Leavenworth County **ARES** group conducts two nets every week. A regular net is held every Thursday evening (except the first Thursday of the month), at 7:30pm on the 145.33- repeater, and an Information and Training Net every Sunday evening at 7:30pm on the 147.00+ repeater (PL tone of 151.4 required). Any amateurs interested in emergency communications are invited to join.

Minutes of 6 March 2008 Meeting

1. President Dan Borneman - W9JXZ - called meeting to order and held a round-robin for introductions. There were 20 members in attendance. Including our most recent member Robert M. Kimbrell, W7KU.

2. Minutes for February meeting were accepted with one correction. Howard Walker's call sign is KOHVD.

3. Several people were able to upgrade their licenses after the last testing session, including John Bennett's upgrade to General.

4. Treasurer Evan Strawbridge, WO4AVN, submitted his report with a balance of \$995.17 going into March. In addition the savings account has been located. There is \$1,400 in the account. A motion was passed for Evan to switch the money to an account that would earn more interest. Evan also informed the club that the tax return was being completed at this time.

5. Gary Auchard, WB0MNA, reported that the QRP event was a success. Members were able to talk to the east coast, west coast and even to Hawaii. The temperature was in the mid 30's, the food was good and we gained a new member out of the event, Bob, W7KU. The only downside was there were not as many contacts made due to a RTTY contest going on at the same time on 40 meters. Next year's Freeze Your Keys event may have to take place one week earlier in the year in order to miss the interference from the RTTY contest.

6. Santa Fe Depot was the designated breakfast spot for March 29th. With a time change to 8 AM to hopefully miss some of the Saturday morning rush.

7. President Dan discussed the Club's Web page. He is constantly making changes and improvements to the website. The Kickapoo QRP portion is still under construction at this time. The Thursday night net will be corrected to show it starting at 7:30. President Dan added that he gladly accepts any corrections or critiques. Just a reminder the web address

11. President Dan spoke about the great success of the first program about the Sun given by Doug Hall, KA0VVJ, and he looks forward to future programs. Rich Waelterman, N0XCM and Dan will discuss Batteries and Grounding. Doug, KC5VKG, will be taking care of weather. Gary Auchard, WB0MNA, is planning on working on Soldering on a Saturday at the Club Shack. Dave Phillips, KE0DL and Mac, W0ROO agreed to doing a program on Net Etiquette. Marty Auchard, WB0ERI is working on creating an outline for other Amateur Radio Etiquette programs, to include ARES net etiquette. The race will occur the morning of April 27th, and operators will be needed for anywhere from 2-3 hours (or less in a couple of instances) depending on assignment. Race starts at approximately 0800.

The race course starts near the Prison Training Center and/or the Woodstock Shop, goes up Santa Fe Trail across Hwy 7, then west, then north to the south end of Atchison and back down Hwy 7 to Santa Fe and the Prison Training Center. As intersections are cleared, operators will be released.

Support will be provided by the Leavenworth and Atchison County sheriff's departments as well as the Atchison police force.

and qualifications of the volunteers, keeping in mind that in the event of an emergency they may have to sit in one place for an extended period. Mac McConnell, W0ROO mentioned that he and Rick Reichert, KF4LM have also been helping and working with the hospitals on this exercise, as well as Rich, N0XCM. This was a very interesting subject with a lot of information that I have severely shortened in this space. I would like to suggest that if we run out of program ideas, I would like to hear more about this subject.

13. **Other Club notes:** Gary Adams, WA0BTM, brought up that the special events station for the Titanic W0S.org still needs operators. With Field Day only being 3 months out the location of the event was discussed. The agreed site is to be the Club Station's parking lot. Expect to be propositioned for tables to place food on for the event.

Larry Everitt, WB0PDR, mentioned that he spoke with Representative Steve Whitaker about supporting bill PRB1. Larry was going to touch base with Rep Whitaker to thank him in advance for his support.

After the meeting there was some "show and tell" of QSL cards.

14. This is just a short synopsis of the program given about portable antennas. Any errors are not the fault of the excellent presenter, Gary Auchard, WB0MNA.

Portable antenna's can be easy and inexpensive. The rubber duckie antenna has a lot of limitations. Portable antenna's can be fun, but are also helpful in emergency situations such as ice storms. An example of a HF portable antenna can be one that uses your vehicle as an antenna system. They can even be designed so that you can go into a building and have a coax feed that reaches out to your vehicle. One of the examples that was shown used a receiver hitch, to which you could attach a center loaded antenna. Gary brought two dipole antennas that he felt were excellent for QRP back packs. One of the antennas was a 6 band dipole the other a 4 band.

(Directions for both can be found online and almost all of the items you need to build them can be found at Wal-Mart or Westlake.) They don't have to look pretty, they just have to function. They can be built on a Saturday and with the help of an analyzer you could be up and running in no time. In order to expand to another band you just have to add another jumper to it. An excellent resource for coax with links already attached are computer stores. Just be sure that you have the right adaptors with you when you go out to use your antenna. A very useful item that might be often overlooked would be a camera tripod. Camera tripods can be adapted to become a stand for external antennas, especially in situations where there is no vehicle handy. Camera tripods can be found at the DAV, Salvation Army and other discount used goods stores for around \$3. The camera tripod can be insulated with a few easy modifications. If you are worried about the tripod catching some wind and tipping, a weight or rock tied to the center will do the trick. As will a dog run that you screw into the ground. There are many different antennas that can be attached to the camera tripod: For instance you can just use some coax wire, about 30 or 40 feet, you will need to play with it ahead of time to get the feel of it. An MP1 (superantennas.com) W6NMA telescoping antenna 10-40, manual screw driver proven for back packers. (You can buy a coil for it for \$75.) Base loaded coil telescoping too, you move the jumper from hole to hole for different bands.

VHF & UHF a 5/8th wave gain type antenna. You can get a Buckbuster for \$15, Gary's Buckbuster is 30 years old. Buddy poles are also popular with QRP. To Gary one of the most interesting parts of Ham radio is emergency and on site antenna building. Google "HF Pack" for more information. MFJ has an antenna analyzer for \$259. WB0W has the best price of \$239. WB0W can be found by going North on I-29 to 169 Highway, turn right and look for the big white truck that says WB0W hamfest on it. A ladder or J Pole Antenna is functional and easy to build. Anytime you can it is always best to try to get your antenna outside.
